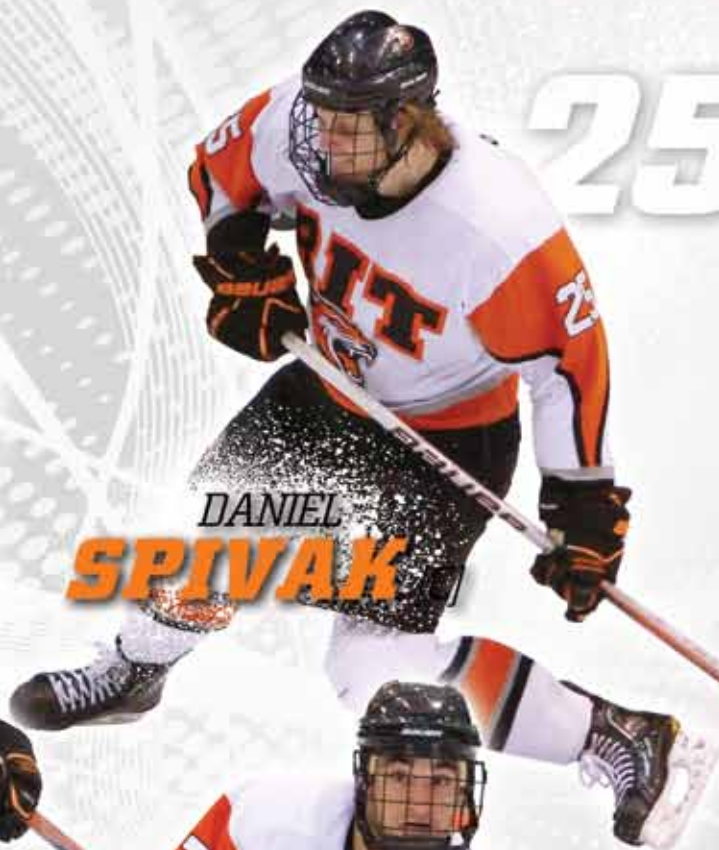

### RIT President

Tiger sports fans have a lot to be proud of:

- In 2011, the Division I men's hockey team clinched its fourth Atlantic Hockey Association regular season title in the past five seasons.
- The women's hockey team spent most of last season ranked No. 1 in the nation and reached the NCAA Division III championship game.
- The men's lacrosse team reached the NCAA Division III semifinals.
- 15 Tiger athletes were All-Americans in 2010-2011; and three were Academic All-Americans.
- In the classroom, our 600 student-athletes carry a median grade-point average of 3.22, which exceeds the overall student body.

This year promises to be another exciting year as the men's hockey team looks to regain its top position in the Atlantic Hockey Association. Our other 23 athletic teams have joined the Liberty League and will make us proud. RIT fits in very well with the intercollegiate athletic philosophy of the other Liberty League institutions. The league includes Bard College, Clarkson University, Hamilton College, Hobart and William Smith Colleges, the University of Rochester, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, St. Lawrence University, Skidmore College, and Union College.

The ascent of our athletic teams is emblematic of the university's momentum in the world of higher education. Today, RIT is among the world's leading career-focused, technological universities, which prides itself on blending innovation

While RIT Athletics experienced some very significant accomplishments to report in 2009-2010 (NCAA Frozen Four appearance), the follow-up year of 2010-2011 was also quite noteworthy. Our teams continued to compete at very high levels. For starters, the overall winning percentage was the highest on record in the past eight years. Leading the way were two teams that made it well into national championship play. Women's ice hockey skated through most of the season without a single loss and on to the National Championship game for the first time in school history. Although they came up short, the team made a tremendous statement at the national level. In addition to this great team achievement, one of our finest players in the history of the program, Sarah Dagg, was named National Player of the Year as well as PAYCHEX Female College Athlete of the Year.

Men's lacrosse followed up in the spring with an incredible run of 19 straight wins (a school record as well). After winning the Empire 8 title, the Tigers went on to wins in the NCAA Championships but were stopped short in the semifinal game against Tufts University. Jake Coon, our head lacrosse coach, was named Empire 8 and ECAC Coach of the Year.

Men's ice hockey followed up its storybook season in 2009-10 (NCAA Frozen Four) with yet another Atlantic Hockey Regular Season Title and a near-miss NCAA appearance. The team played before a record crowd of 10,556 at Blue Cross Arena on Brick City Homecoming weekend.

In addition to these highlights, Tiger wrestler Mike

### RIT Media Policies

#### ► Media Credentials

Requests for media credentials for RIT home games at Ritter Arena must be made at least two days in advance by contacting Joe Venniro at (585) 475-5598 or via e-mail at [jtvtsid@rit.edu](mailto:jtvtsid@rit.edu). Working press box credentials will be issued only to accredited newspapers, magazines, bloggers, radio or television reporters. Press credentials can be picked up in the Sports Information Office during the week or the Ritter Arena Press Box beginning two hours before game time.

#### ► Press Box

RIT's press box is located in the south end of Ritter Arena and is accessible via the stairs located in the main concourse. The press box is a working area. Vulgarity, profanity, and cheering are prohibited. Any behavior deemed unprofessional by RIT staff will result in removal from the game.

#### ► Press Box Services

The RIT Sports Information Department will provide line charts, weekly notes, programs, statistics, and media guides prior to the game. Game statistics and shot charts will be provided between periods and after each contest.

#### ► Photography

Photo passes are limited to team photographers and accredited media (newspapers, bloggers, TV, print). All requests for passes must be made to Joe Venniro at least one day prior to the scheduled game.

#### ► Radio

Ritter Arena has one phone line available for an opponent's (student or commercial) radio station, and is situated in the press box closest to the entrance. All visiting radio stations must request space at least three days prior to the game.

#### ► Interviews

Coach Wayne Wilson is available for telephone interviews with the media during the week. Please contact Joe Venniro to arrange the interview at least one day prior to the requested interview date. Pre-game interviews with coaches and players must be arranged through the RIT Sports Information Department at least one day in advance. Following home games, Coach Wilson and RIT players will be available for a post-game press conference or interviews approximately 10 minutes after the conclusion of the game. All post-game interview requests must be made through the SID in the press box prior to the final two minutes of the game. RIT maintains a strict closed-door locker room policy. Access to the locker room is limited to the players, coaches, and named Athletics Department staff.

#### ► RIT on the Radio

All RIT men's hockey games are broadcast on WTR 89.7 FM in the Rochester area or online at [witr.rit.edu](http://witr.rit.edu). Scott Biggar '89, Chris Lerch '84, and Ed Trefzger '84 are the voices of the Tigers.

#### ► RIT on the Web

RIT's official athletics website is [www.ritathletics.com](http://www.ritathletics.com). The site features information on all 24 RIT Athletics teams. Fans can access live video at [b2livetv.com](http://b2livetv.com) for a small fee per game. Streaming radio broadcasts can be found online at [witr.rit.edu](http://witr.rit.edu).

Wayne Wilson enters his 13th season as head coach of the RIT men's hockey team. Fresh off of leading his Tigers to their fourth Atlantic Hockey Association regular season championship in the last five seasons in 2010-11, the Tigers advanced to the AHA Championship game for the second straight season, finishing with a 19-11-8 record. The Tigers rattled off an 11-game unbeaten streak during the middle of the season, and once again, were one of the highest scoring teams in Division I.

The Guelph, Ontario, native has led the Tigers to a 110-59-19 record since the 2006-07 season, including a 92-31-16 mark all-time in AHA play. In 2010-11, the Tigers tied their own AHA record for fewest losses (5).

Wilson enjoyed a magical year behind the bench in 2009-10. He, along with the Tigers, accrued a bevy of individual and team accomplishments, including the Spencer Penrose Award as Division I National Coach of the Year. Wilson became the first coach to win the National Coach of the Year at both the Division I and Division III levels. He led RIT to its first Atlantic Hockey Championship and a spot in the NCAA Tournament. The Tigers captured the attention of the country as they made their historic run to the Frozen Four, playing in front of 34,954 fans at Ford Field in Detroit. RIT finished the season with a school record 28 wins, including a 12-game winning streak from Feb. 12 to March 27. RIT finished the season ranked No. 10 in the *USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine* National Poll, and was the only Division I team to win its conference regular season and postseason championships.

On Oct. 30, 2009, Wilson became the all-time leader in coaching wins at RIT, picking up his 189th victory in a 6-2 win over Connecticut. On Jan. 15, 2010, Wilson recorded his 200th win, as RIT blanked Connecticut, 4-0.

During his tenure at RIT, Wilson has guided the Tigers to a 235-114-33 record. In just six seasons of Division I play, he has led the Tigers to several victories over nationally ranked teams, including wins over No. 2 Denver, and No. 12 New Hampshire in the NCAA East Regional on March 26-27, 2010. Denver is the highest ranked team that RIT has beaten at the Division I level.

On Oct. 27, 2007, the Tigers defeated then No. 18 Cornell 4-1, and two months later, on Dec. 29, RIT shocked the Division I hockey landscape, defeating No. 14 Minnesota at the Dodge Holiday Classic in front of 10,046 fans at Mariucci Arena. It was the first time Minnesota had lost a game in their home tournament since the 1999-00 season. On Oct. 30, 2010, the Tigers defeated No. 14 Cornell for the second straight time, 5-3 at famed Lynah Rink.

In 2008-09, Wilson led the Tigers to a 23-13-2 mark, which included an 11-game winning streak, jump-started by a win over No. 10 Air Force.

In 2007-08, forward Simon Lambert became the first RIT player to be named a finalist for the Hobey Baker Award, college hockey's finest honor.

Wilson is no stranger to success at the collegiate level. He won a national title as a player at Bowling Green State University in 1984. He also led the Falcons to three NCAA Tournament appearances as an assistant coach.

Wilson led RIT to four NCAA tournament appearances, and four ECAC West Tournament titles, and was named the ECAC West Coach of the Year three times. He earned AHCA Coach of the Year honors in 2000-01 when he guided the Tigers to their fifth appearance in the NCAA Division III National Championship game after an unbeaten regular season (22-0-1, finished 26-1-1).

In 2001, Jerry Galway became the second player in RIT history to be named NCAA Division III Player of the Year.

In 2009-10, Jared DeMichiel and Dan Ringwald were the AHA Goaltender and Defenseman of the Year, respectively, and garnered first team honors. Ringwald earned All-USCHO.com second team honors and was a three-time All-AHA first team selection. Chris Tanev was named the 2010 AHA Rookie of the Year, while Shane Madolora garnered the 2011 AHA Goaltender of the Year honor and was an INCH Second Team selection. Lambert won the Atlantic Hockey Leading scorer award in 2008. Overall, 15 Tigers have earned 31 All-AHA honors since 2006-07.

Many of Wilson's players have graduated and moved on to professional careers within their field of study. Last season the team recorded a 3.23 GPA, exceeding the university average. Thirteen players earned AHA All-Academic team honors.

While he was at Bowling Green, several of Wilson's players went on to successful careers in the National Hockey League. In 2007, Steve Pinizzotto became the first Tiger to sign an NHL contract at the D1 level. Pinizzotto was a key component of the two-time Calder Cup Champion Hershey Bears of the AHL and may make his NHL debut in 2011-12. Since the end of the 2006-07 season, 21 players have gone on to sign pro contracts, including Tanev. Tyler Brenner signed with the Toronto Maple Leafs in March 2011.

Tanev became RIT's first player to suit up in an NHL contest, making his debut with the Canucks on Jan. 18, 2011. He played 29 regular season games and five playoff games for the Canucks, including games five, six, and seven of the 2011 Stanley Cup Finals.

Wilson earned a degree in health, physical education, and recreation from Bowling Green in 1984, and added his master's degree in education at BGSU in 1987. He lives in Pittsford with his wife, Lynn, and children Stephanie (21) and Stu (19). Stephanie graduated from Bowling Green in 2011. Stu is playing for the Cedar Rapids Roughriders of the USHL in 2011-12, and has also committed to play at Yale in 2012-13.

Brian Hills begins his seventh season at RIT, and fifth as the associate head coach. Hills, who joined RIT before its inaugural season of Division I play in 2005, has been a vital reason for RIT's success. Hills received the prestigious Terry Flanagan Award at the 2011 American Hockey Coaches Association Banquet, honoring an outstanding assistant coach's career body of work.

Hills has played a major role in recruiting and building a team that won the 2010 Atlantic Hockey and NCAA East Region Championships and advanced to the Frozen Four. In addition, Hills helped lead RIT to four Atlantic Hockey regular season championships in five seasons.

Hills played an integral role in the development of defenseman Chris Tanev, the 2010 Atlantic Hockey Association Rookie of the Year, who signed as a free agent with the Vancouver Canucks in May 2010. Tanev made his NHL debut on Jan. 18, 2011, played 29 regular season games, and five playoff games for the Canucks, including games five, six, and seven of the 2011 Stanley Cup Finals.

Before his success at RIT, Hills was the head coach at the State University College at Geneseo for four seasons. In his last season at Geneseo, he led the Knights to a record of 18-7-4, a SUNYAC Championship, the quarterfinals of the NCAA Division III Tournament, and a No. 7 ranking in the final Division III poll. Hills amassed a record of 53-42-14 while reviving the Geneseo hockey program. His record during his final two seasons at Geneseo was 32-14-9.

Prior to coaching at Geneseo, Hills worked for seven years at Division I Bowling Green. During that time he assisted with Team Canada's national team selection committee in 1997 and 1998. He also coached the Chur (Switzerland) Junior Hockey Team in 1986-87.



**Assistant Coach**  
**Dave Insalaco**

Dave Insalaco enters his fourth season as an assistant coach for the RIT men's hockey program. His knack for finding several quality recruits has helped the Tigers become one of the top teams in Division I, as evidenced by the squad's three straight Atlantic Hockey Association regular season championships and trip to the 2010 NCAA Division I Frozen Four.

Insalaco spent two seasons with the Green Bay Gamblers of the United States Hockey League. Midway through the 2007-08 season, he took over as the head coach and general manager, mentoring current RIT seniors Cameron Burt and Taylor McReynolds, and junior Chris Saracino.

Insalaco began his coaching career in 2002-03 as a volunteer assistant at SUNY Brockport. In 2003-04, he moved to SUNY Geneseo as an assistant coach. There, he worked under current RIT Associate Head Coach Brian Hills for two seasons.

In 2009 and 2011, Insalaco coached at the USA Hockey Select Under-17 camp in Rochester with several of the nation's top collegiate coaches. In 2011, he was chosen to coach in Select 17 All-Star game.

Insalaco played two years of professional hockey, from 2000-02, for the Adirondack IceHawks of the United Hockey

Hills is a graduate of Bowling Green State University, where he was a teammate of RIT Head Coach Wayne Wilson. Hills was a two-time All-American and two-time Hobey Baker Memorial Award finalist. He led the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA) in scoring twice and was the CCHA Player of the Year in 1983. In addition, he was a two-time CCHA All-Academic team member, and was a second team CoSIDA/GTE Academic All-American as a senior. Hills left Bowling Green as its all-time leading scorer and is currently second on the list. He scored 116 goals and added 154 assists for 270 points in 156 games. In 1982-83 he set a school single-season record that still stands with 94 points (37-57-94) in 40 games.

After graduating from Bowling Green with a degree in business administration, Hills spent 11 seasons playing professionally in Europe—eight years in Switzerland and three in Germany. He won three gold medals with Team Canada in Europe's Spengler Cup before returning to his alma mater, where he spent seven seasons as an assistant coach from 1994-2001.

"Brian has been an invaluable asset to the RIT hockey program," said Wilson. "He is a proven winner and will no doubt be an excellent Division I head coach."

Hills lives in Honeoye Falls with his wife, Andrea. They have two children, a daughter Alexandra (22), and son Trevor (19). Alexandra is a senior forward on the 2011 NCAA National Runner-up RIT women's hockey team. Trevor will play the 2011-12 season for the Chilliwack Chiefs of the British Columbia Hockey League.

League, recording 10 goals and 21 assists for 31 points in 128 career games. He quickly became a fan favorite in Adirondack, winning the Unsung Hero and 110 Percent Award as voted on by the fans in 2001-02. Insalaco helped lead Adirondack to a division title in 2000-01.

The Greece native played collegiately at SUNY Brockport from 1996-00. Insalaco tallied 47 goals and 62 assists for 109 points in 108 career games for the Golden Eagles. He was an All-SUNYAC second team selection in 2000 and Chase Memorial Academic Athletic Scholarship winner.

"Dave is a young, smart, energetic coach," said RIT Head Coach Wayne Wilson. "He excels in recruiting, skill development, and video analysis, and understands the game very well. Every year Dave has taken on more responsibility and is the nuts and bolts of our team's success."

In addition, Insalaco's sister Kim was a member of the 2006 United States Women's Olympic Hockey Team that earned a bronze medal in Turin, Italy.

Insalaco, who earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in education from SUNY Brockport, lives in Fairport with his wife, Erika, and newborn son, David.

Mike Germain returns for his sixth season as a volunteer assistant coach. He works primarily with the Tiger goaltenders. Under his tutelage, Shane Madolora led all Division I goaltenders with the best save percentage in 2010-11, while Jared DeMichiel led the nation in wins the season prior.

# Season Outlook

The 2011-12 RIT men's hockey team will look to win its fourth straight Atlantic Hockey regular season title, and advance to the NCAA Tournament for the second time in three seasons. Last season, the Tigers were one goal shy of advancing to the NCAA Tournament, finishing with a 19-11-8 record. Just two seasons ago, RIT emerged as the country's Cinderella story, advancing to the NCAA Frozen Four.

The Tigers have a sparkling 110-59-19 record over the past five years, winning at least 19 games in each season. Once again, the Tigers return a strong group of playoff-tested veterans and bring in an extremely talented group of newcomers.

RIT will play 34 regular season games this season, opening with a tough AHA conference game against Niagara on Oct. 8 at Ritter Arena. The following weekend, the Tigers host St. Lawrence in what could possibly be a sold-out house at Blue Cross Arena in downtown Rochester on Oct. 15, as the focal point of Brick City Homecoming and Family Weekend. RIT will also play non-conference home games against ECAC foes Union and Rensselaer, both of whom advanced to the 2011 NCAA Tournament. On Dec. 29-30, the Tigers travel to Vermont to play Lake Superior State and Ferris State of the CCHA in the Catamount Cup. The following weekend, RIT rings in 2012 with a pair of road games at perennial power Wisconsin, in what will be a rematch of the 2010 Frozen Four semifinal, won by the Badgers.

"We are playing a pretty challenging non-conference schedule," said RIT Head Coach Wayne Wilson, now in his 13th year with the Tigers. "We jump right into conference play against Niagara and then face St. Lawrence in front of what should be a great crowd as part of our Brick City Homecoming Weekend. Union and Rensselaer were both (NCAA) tournament teams last year, and then we head to Vermont to play two good teams in Ferris State and Lake Superior State. Obviously, we know how good Wisconsin is, and to play two games in front of huge crowds will be exciting. We like to play a tough non-conference schedule that challenges us and makes us better for league and postseason play," said Wilson.

Twenty-seven of RIT's 34 games will be against Atlantic Hockey foes. The Tigers will play Niagara, Robert Morris, Canisius, Mercyhurst, and Air Force three times this season, and will play Army, Connecticut, Holy Cross, Sacred Heart, American International, and Bentley twice.

Wilson, the all-time leader in coaching wins at RIT and winner of the 2010 Spencer Penrose Award as the Division I Coach of the Year, is thrilled that RIT has become not only a top AHA team, but one that has achieved national prominence.

"Our goal hasn't changed since we became eligible for postseason play (in 2007-08)," said Wilson. "Ultimately, our goal is to advance to the NCAA Tournament. That means putting ourselves in contention for home-ice advantage in the league tournament, and winning the Atlantic Hockey Championship. From there you prepare one game at a time. With the

success we had in 2010, you never know what that means, it could be one and done, but we now know a Frozen Four berth is attainable."

Three defensemen, seniors Chris Haltigin and Daniel Spivak, along with junior Chris Saracino will serve as the 2011-12 captains. Haltigin was an assistant captain last season.

The Tigers return 19 players from last season's squad and Wilson and his staff have recruited seven highly touted newcomers.

### ► Forwards

Despite the loss of its top two scorers from last season, the Tigers return a strong group of talented forwards from an offense that finished 13th nationally in goals per game a year ago. With the addition of a group of accomplished freshmen, the offense has a chance to be even more dynamic this season.

Senior Cameron Burt, along with junior Adam Hartley, and sophomores Ben Lynch, Adam Mitchell, and Mike Colavecchia will help shoulder the load offensively in 2011-12. Burt battled through injuries last season, after recording a team-high 47 points in 2009-10 en route to earning AHA and NCAA East Regional All-Tournament Team honors. Hartley recorded 13 points in his first 13 games last season before finishing with 25 points on 11 goals and 14 assists. Lynch ended the season strong en route to tallying 30 points in 37 games, while Mitchell chipped in with 11 goals, tied for third on the team. Colavecchia recorded 19 points and showed flashes of brilliance.

Seniors Mark Cornacchia, Scott Knowles, and Taylor McReynolds and juniors Jeff Smith, and Bryan Potts will be called upon to contribute more offensively. All five played a key role in RIT's run to the 2010 Frozen Four and know what it takes to win at this level.

Talented newcomers Matt Garbowsky, Brad McGowan, Brandon Thompson, and Brad Reid will look to crack the lineup immediately and provide a spark offensively. All four players enjoyed tremendous success at the junior level and will look to continue that at RIT.

"Up front, we lost four forwards that made a big impact offensively, and all had important roles on our team," said Wilson. "That being said, I really like what we return, along with one of the most talented group of newcomers we've had come in."

### ► Defensemen

The defensive unit is arguably RIT's deepest position, as seven players return from a squad that led the AHA in goals against average a year ago. The Tigers allowed just two goals per contest over their last 23 games and recorded six shutouts during that stretch. RIT has a strong blend of offensive, stay at home, and physical defensemen that will help them be successful in 2011-12.

Senior captain Chris Haltigin battled through injuries last season, but is still regarded as one of the

top defensemen in the conference. He was a 2010 NCAA East Region All-Tournament Team selection and along with rock solid defender and tri-captain Daniel Spivak will lead the squad on and off the ice. Junior tri-captain Chris Saracino enjoyed a tremendous season in 2010-11, leading all RIT defensemen with 20 points, while recording a team-best plus-28 rating. Saracino was named an All-AHA second team selection.

Senior Trevor Eckenswiller was plus-14 in 28 games last season and is completely healthy after suffering a season-ending injury in 2009-10 and nagging maladies in 2010-11. Sophomores Greg Noyes, Nolan Descoteaux, and Eliot Raibl all gained valuable experience last season and will be expected to contribute more in 2010-11. Noyes tallied 17 points and was plus-19 in 36 games last season, while Descoteaux played in 35 contests.

Freshman Stuart Brownell, who stands 6-foot-4, will look to follow in RIT's rich tradition of outstanding blue-liners.

"We return seven defensemen from a team that led the league in goals against average," said Wilson. "This is an extremely talented group of defensemen that can move the puck, show offensive ability, and be physical. Our leadership will come from our defense this season."

### ► Goalies

RIT returns senior Shane Madolora, who enjoyed a breakout season in 2010-11, finishing 17-3-7, while leading the nation with a .935 save percentage, and six shutouts, to go along with a sparkling 1.93 goals against average, third best in Division I. He began the season with a 20-game unbeaten streak en route to being named the AHA Goaltender of the Year and earning All-AHA first team honors. He was also named an Inside College Hockey Second Team All-American.

Sophomore Josh Watson returns after a promising rookie season. His three starts came against Nebraska-Omaha, Union, and Merrimack, all of whom advanced to the 2011 NCAA Tournament. Freshman Jordan Ruby led the Wellington Dukes to the 2011 Ontario Junior Hockey League Championship and a spot in the prestigious Royal Bank Cup.

"We really feel great about our goaltending situation," said Wilson. "Shane (Madolora) had such a tremendous season last year and Josh (Watson) will continue to get better. Jordan's (Ruby) junior numbers were outstanding last year. We have three number-one type goaltenders."

RIT will once again have an eye on the postseason, as they battle the top teams in the country. The Tigers will look to secure a top seed for the Atlantic Hockey Championship, win the postseason tournament, and try to make another deep run into the month of April, with Tampa, Fla. and the Frozen Four in its sights.

# 2010-11 Season in Review

The 2010-11 RIT men's hockey team won its fourth Atlantic Hockey regular season title in five seasons and was one goal shy of reaching the NCAA Tournament for the second straight year. The Tigers finished 19-11-8, en route to recording their fifth straight season with at least 19 wins.

The Tigers were once again among the nation's elite teams, securing a road win at nationally-ranked Cornell, while playing five teams that advanced to the 2011 NCAA Tournament. On Oct. 16, the Tigers played in front of their largest regular season crowd in program history, drawing a sellout crowd of 10,556 fans against UMass Lowell at Blue Cross Arena.

The Tigers finished in the top-20 nationally in scoring, scoring defense, power play, and penalty-killing percentages. RIT enjoyed great scoring depth, with six players scoring at least 20 points, and 16 in double figures. Five Tigers scored at least 10 goals.

In goal, sophomore Shane Madolora was the AHA Regular Season Goaltender of the Year and an Inside College Hockey (INCH) Second Team All-American. Madolora led the nation with a .935 save percentage, along with six shutouts, and was third among all Division I goaltenders with a 1.93 goals against average, both RIT single season records. He was 17-3-7 overall and 16-2-6 in AHA play.

Up front, senior Andrew Favot and junior Tyler Brenner led the way, with 43, and 41 points respectively. Favot dished out 30 assists to lead the way, while Brenner scored 26 goals, one shy of the RIT Division I team record. Favot was an All-AHA third team selection and finished his stellar RIT career with 130 points (41-89-130), second most at the Division I level. He won RIT's Dan Barrows

Fan's Choice and Art Thomas Teammate awards. Brenner was an All-AHA second team selection and was co-winner of RIT's Greg Moss Hard Hat Award. Brenner finished his RIT career with 55 goals, tied for the most at the Division I level. In late March, Brenner signed a professional contract with the Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League.

Freshman Ben Lynch recorded 20 points over his last 17 games to finish third on the team in scoring with 30 points. He was named RIT's Craig Lauzon Award Winner as the Rookie of the Year. Junior Cameron Burt struggled through injuries and a mid-season transition to playing defense to finish with 28 points on six goals and 22 assists in 33 games. Sophomore Adam Hartley scored 14 points in his first 13 games, finishing with 25 points on 11 goals and 14 assists.

Senior forwards Mike Janda and Sean Murphy finished their collegiate careers in style. Janda tallied a career-high 10 goals, and 14 points and was plus-7. Murphy, a captain, chipped in with 13 points and tallied four goals over his last five games, including two in the AHA Semifinal against Connecticut. He was an AHA All-Tournament Team selection.

Juniors Scott Knowles, a gritty forward, tallied 13 points, tying a RIT single-season Division I record with three shorthanded goals. Classmate Mark Cornacchia was one of the squad's best penalty killers, chipping in with 10 points. Fellow junior Taylor McReynolds recorded a career-high 14 points, while leading all of Division I and setting a RIT single-season record with 138 penalty minutes.

The first-year duo of Mike Colavecchia and Adam Mitchell showed flashes of brilliance during the season. Colavecchia chipped in with 19 points in 35

games, while Mitchell scored 11 goals and added six assists. Mitchell scored the overtime game-winner in RIT's first win of the season over Robert Morris. Sophomores Bryan Potts and Jeff Smith improved as the season progressed. Potts finished with six points, including a career-high effort of two goals and an assist against Robert Morris. Smith recorded a goal and an assist in RIT's win over Cornell.

RIT's defensive unit, which started the season with three first-year players in the lineup, improved greatly throughout the season to post six shutouts and allow just under two goals per game over the final 23 contests of the season.

Chris Saracino enjoyed a breakout season, tallying 20 points on five goals and 15 assists, while leading the team with a plus-28 rating to earn All-AHA second team honors. Defensive partner Greg Noyes stepped right into the lineup, recording 17 points and a plus-19 rating.

Junior captain Chris Haltigin battled through nagging injuries to finish with 14 points, while fellow junior Trevor Eckenswiller rebounded from a season-ending injury in 2009-10 to finish with a plus-14 rating along with eight assists.

Junior Daniel Spivak evolved into a rock solid, physical stay-at-home defenseman, and was rewarded by winning RIT's Greg Moss Hard Hat Award. Freshmen Nolan Descoteaux and Eliot Raibl showed plenty of improvement during the season and will be called upon to step even more in 2011-12.

In goal, Jan Ropponen picked up a pair of wins, including the victory over Cornell. Josh Watson saw action in four games, with all three starts coming against teams that made the NCAA Tournament (Nebraska-Omaha, Union, and Merrimack).

## Tigers in the Pros

When RIT made the move to Division I in 2005, it was rare to hear about RIT hockey standouts continuing their dream on the ice after wowing the Ritter Arena faithful. Since 2007, 21 Tigers have moved on to play in the professional ranks. These Tigers are living their dream of playing pro hockey, spread out all over the globe, from Quebec to Italy, Germany to Slovenia, Belgium to Texas.

In April 2010, Chris Tanev was a freshman defenseman playing a key role in RIT's legendary run to the Frozen Four. Just 14 months later, Tanev had signed a professional contract with the Vancouver Canucks, becoming RIT's first player to skate in the NHL. He played in 29 regular season games and games five, six, and seven of the Stanley Cup Finals. The 21-year-old defenseman drew praise from several national media outlets in the hockey world for his poise and strong play. Tanev will look to earn a full-time spot with the Canucks for the 2011-12 season.

After the 2011 season, Tyler Brenner signed with the Toronto Maple Leafs and will look to make an immediate impact. Bobby Raymond, a 2009 graduate, was part of the 2011 Calder Cup Champion Binghamton Senators.

Steve Pinizzotto was the first Tiger to leave school early, signing a contract with the Washington Capitals in 2007, after his sophomore season. Pinizzotto played a key role in leading the Hershey Bears of the American Hockey League to back-to-back Calder Cup Championships in 2009 and 2010. In July 2011, he signed with the Vancouver Canucks.

Several RIT alumni, such as 2008 Hobey Baker Finalist Simon Lambert, Justin Hofstetter, Matt Crowell, and Stephen Burns currently play in Europe. Numerous players, including Jared DeMichiel, Dan Ringwald, and Andrew Favot, play in the ECHL, trying to fulfill a lifelong dream.

Tanev, Pinizzotto, Raymond, DeMichiel, and Brenner were invited to NHL Training Camps in 2011.

"It's exciting knowing that their dreams of playing in the NHL and receiving interest from NHL teams is that much more attainable now," says RIT Head Coach Wayne Wilson. "We've gone from a program where there was very little recognition in the pro ranks to now having guys that have a chance to make a name for themselves five, six, or even 10 years down the road at the highest level. Our players consider themselves Tigers for life and have a committed sense of pride in what they accomplished at RIT."

As an assistant coach at Bowling Green, Wilson (1988-99) mentored several players who have enjoyed excellent careers in the NHL, including Norris Trophy winner and three-time All-Star defenseman Rob Blake, while he was an assistant coach at Bowling Green University. Wilson also coached former NHL players Dan Bylsma (2009 Stanley Cup Champion Head Coach of the Pittsburgh Penguins), Todd Reirden (Pittsburgh Penguins Assistant Coach), Kevin Dahl, Nelson Emerson, Mike Johnson, Ken Klee, Peter Ratchuk, Paul Ysebart, and former Rochester American and Buffalo Sabre Brian Holzinger.

## RIT At A Glance

**FOUNDED IN 1829**, Rochester Institute of Technology is a privately endowed, coeducational university with nine colleges emphasizing career education and experiential learning.

**THE CAMPUS** occupies 1,300 acres in suburban Rochester, the third-largest city in New York state. RIT also has international campuses in Eastern Europe and Dubai.

**THE RIT STUDENT BODY** consists of approximately 14,225 undergraduate and 2,980 graduate students. Enrolled students represent all 50 states and more than 100 countries.

RIT is an internationally recognized leader in preparing deaf and hard-of-hearing students for successful careers in professional and technical fields. The university provides unparalleled access and support services for the more than 1,300 deaf and hard-of-hearing students who live, study, and work with hearing students on the RIT campus.

The library provides access to more than 250 electronic databases, 36,000 electronic journals, and 75,000 e-books. Resource materials also include more than 12,000 audio, film, and video titles and more than 500,000 books and print journals.

**HOUSING:** Many of RIT's full-time students live in RIT residence halls, apartments, or townhouses on campus. On-campus fraternities, sororities, and special-interest houses are also available. Freshmen are guaranteed housing.

**STUDENT ACTIVITIES:** Major social events and activities are sponsored by the College Activities Board, Residence Halls Association, sororities, fraternities, and special-interest clubs of many kinds. There are more than 200 clubs and student organizations on campus.

RIT offers a wide variety of activities for students at all levels of ability. More than 50 percent of our undergraduate students participate in intramural sports ranging from flag football to golf and indoor soccer. Facilities include the Gordon Field House, featuring two swimming pools, a fitness center, indoor track and an event venue with seating for 8,500; the Hale-Andrews Student Life Center, with five multipurpose courts, eight racquetball courts, and a dance/aerobics studio; the Ritter Ice Arena; outdoor tennis courts; an all-weather track; and athletic fields.

## Rochester at a Glance



*Greater Rochester International Jazz Festival*

High-tech industry, entertainment, history and culture, sports and recreation—you'll find it all in Rochester. The Genesee River—one of the few north-flowing rivers in the world—cuts through the center of the city, where it tumbles 96 feet at High Falls before flowing into Lake Ontario.

The Greater Rochester area is home to more than 1 million people, making it the third-largest metropolitan area in New York state. There are more than a dozen colleges and universities located in the area, where more than 60,000 undergraduate and graduate students call Rochester "home." RIT's 1,300-acre campus is located in the suburb of Henrietta, about six miles from downtown.

First settled in the early 1800s, Rochester quickly became the largest flour-producing city in the world. Today, the community is frequently labeled the "World's Imaging Center," due in part to the corporate influence of Eastman Kodak, Xerox, and Bausch & Lomb. The area is also home to high-profile companies like Wegmans Food Markets, Paychex, and Constellation Brands. Residents can see several high-profile off-Broadway shows at Geva Theatre or the Auditorium Theater, or attend one of the city's several weekend festivals such as Corn Hill or Park Avenue. Good suburban public schools, affordable housing, and ease of commute are also some

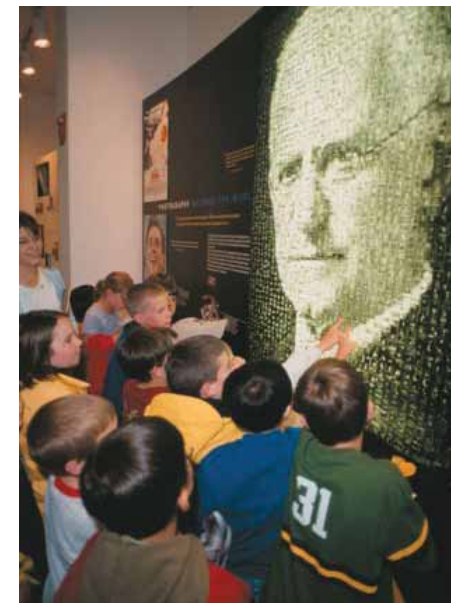
of the reasons Rochester was ranked by *Expansion Management* magazine as having the best quality of life among the top 50 metro areas in the United States. *Places Rated Almanac* ranked Rochester as the sixth best place to live in America. These are among a number of national rankings that you will find on Rochester, ranging from *U.S. News & World Report* to *Popular Science*.

### ► Explore the Finger Lakes and Lake Ontario

From the wine country of the Finger Lakes (nearly 100 wineries) to the shores of Lake Ontario, Greater Rochester has a rich and vibrant character. You will find historic architecture, festivals, and plenty of shopping, dining, and entertainment options throughout the region. If you love the outdoors, there are parks, beaches, golf courses, ski resorts, mountains, gorges, lakes, and streams to provide opportunities for recreation and sightseeing. RIT is also a proud partner of the New York Wine & Culinary Center, located in nearby Canandaigua.

A sports town during any season, Rochester is home to several professional sports teams, including the Red Wings (baseball), Americans (ice hockey), Knighthawks (indoor lacrosse), and the Rhinos (soccer). Each summer, the Buffalo Bills training camp comes to town. Rochester is also home to an annual major tournament on the PGA tour at Locust Hill Country Club, the PGA Championship. World-ranked Oak Hill Country Club also hosted the 2008 PGA Senior Championship and will host the 2013 PGA Championship. In addition, the fabled course has been the site of many other major golf championships, including the 1989 U.S. Open and 1995 Ryder Cup.

## Academic & Athletic Success

For more than a century, the standard for intercollegiate athletics has been established at Rochester Institute of Technology, where student-athletes excel both in the classroom and in competition.

*U.S. News & World Report* has named RIT one of the leading comprehensive universities in the north in terms of academic reputation for more than two decades. RIT's student-athletes are no exception.

Last year, student-athletes posted an impressive 3.22 grade-point average on a 4.0 scale, exceeding the university average of 3.05. During the spring quarter, an unprecedented 74 athletes recorded perfect 4.0 GPAs. The men's hockey team held the second highest grade-point average among all RIT men's athletics teams at 3.23. **Scott Knowles (marketing)** and **Trevor Eckenswiler (biomedical sciences)** recorded the two highest grade-point averages on the men's hockey team in 2010-11.

Today, RIT offers 24 varsity sports, including men's and women's cross country, men's and women's crew, men's and women's soccer, women's tennis, and women's volleyball in the fall. Winter competition includes men's and women's basketball, men's and women's ice hockey, men's and women's swimming, men's and women's indoor track, and wrestling. Spring competition features baseball, men's and women's crew, men's and women's lacrosse, softball, men's tennis, and men's and women's outdoor track.

Each year, more than 550 student-athletes compete on RIT athletics teams. Ten percent of these athletes are deaf or hard-of-hearing students enrolled in the National Technical Institute for the Deaf, one of RIT's nine colleges.

With the exception of men's ice hockey, which will be playing its seventh season as a Division I program, RIT is a Division III institution that joined the NCAA in 1958. The Tigers compete in the Atlantic Hockey Association and Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC), and this season, the Division III programs join the Liberty League.

Numerous student-athletes have been honored for their excellent work not only on the field, but in the classroom. This past season, men's track and field and wrestling stand-outs **Mike Dempsey** and **Mike McNally** shared the Male Senior Athlete of the Year, while **Sarah Dagg** of the women's hockey team garnered the Female Athlete of the Year Award.

In just two seasons at RIT, Dempsey rewrote the record book in the pole vault, earning four All-American honors. In 2010, Dempsey earned national runner-up honors at 2010 NCAA Division III Indoor and Outdoor Track and Field Championships. He was named the Empire 8 Conference and United States Track and Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA) Atlantic Region Field Athlete of the Year. In 2011, Dempsey placed fifth at the NCAA Indoor Championships, and seventh at the Outdoor Championships, earning All-American honors in each. He holds the school record in both the indoor and outdoor pole vault with identical leaps of 5.16 meters. Dempsey, a 2011 Capital One/Co-SIDA Academic All-American, was a seven-time Empire 8 and five-time RIT Male Athlete of the Week.

McNally is one of the most decorated wrestlers in RIT's storied history. A two-time national runner-up and four-

time participant in the NCAA Championships, McNally finished his career at RIT with a 141-20 record, including a 56-2 record in dual meets. After finishing 68-14 with a pair of NCAA Championship appearances over his first two seasons, McNally broke out as a junior in 2008-09, winning his first 31 matches at 125 lbs., before finishing 35-2, earning national runner-up honors. After missing all but one match in 2009-10 due to a serious neck injury, he came back strong in 2010-11, winning his first 20 matches at 133 lbs. en route to his second national runner-up honor, finishing 37-4. McNally's 141 wins and 56 dual victories are the second most in program history. He is a 10-time RIT Male Athlete, two-time ECWC Rookie and four-time ECWC Player of the Week, and won 10 tournament titles in his four seasons.

Dagg was named the Laura Hurd Award Winner as the Division III National Women's Ice Hockey Player of the Year in 2011. A three-year captain, Dagg led RIT to by far its greatest season in program history, as the Tigers finished as the national runner-up. The Tigers were the No. 1 team in the nation for a majority of the season, finishing 26-2-2, while winning their first ECAC West Championship. Dagg finished with 18 goals and 24 assists in 30 games, fourth-best nationally, en route to earning 2011 ECAC West Player of the Year and All-ECAC West first team honors. In addition, Dagg was named a RBK AHCA All-American for the third straight year and earned USCHO.com first team honors. Dagg enjoyed a storied four-year career at RIT, leading the Tigers to an 85-17-7 mark, while becoming the program's all-time leading scorer with 154 points (63-91-154) in 109 games. After scoring 27 points as a freshman, she led the Tigers in scoring with 40 points (16-24-40), as RIT finished 21-3-2 in 2008-09 and was ranked as high as No. 2 nationally. She was named an All-ECAC West second team selection and an RBK AHCA second team All-American. In 2009-10, Dagg set a career-high with 45 points (17-28-45) and was an RBK AHCA first team All-American, and earned All-ECAC West first team honors.

Lou Spiotti Jr., Executive Director for the Center of Intercollegiate Athletics, believes that the student-athletes' remarkable cumulative GPA is a testament to their hard work not only the playing field, but the classroom as well.

"The RIT student-athletes epitomize the Greek ideal of 'sound body, sound mind,'" said Spiotti. "The discipline and work ethic required to succeed in athletics are transferable skills. Our athletes succeed in many aspects of their lives because they understand and embrace the world of competition and achievement both on the field of play and in the classroom. They push themselves to reach for higher levels of success. I believe that for them to be as good as they have demonstrated takes focus, discipline, goal setting, good health and stamina, and excellent time management skills. All these things and more help them not only to progress through their college years, but also to excel. Thus, we have our student-athletes achieving a 3.22 overall grade-point average, which is significantly higher than the general student population."

## Atlantic Hockey at a Glance

A new chapter in the history of college hockey was ushered into existence when the Atlantic Hockey Association was created on June 30, 2003, by nine charter members. The sixth Division I men's ice hockey conference arose when the founding members—American International, Bentley, Canisius, Connecticut, Holy Cross, Mercyhurst, Quinnipiac, Sacred Heart, and the United States Military Academy (Army)—required an organization that represented their specific needs. The group of nine broke away from their former conference affiliation, the Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference, and formed a conference specific to the sport of ice hockey.

Robert DeGregorio, former commissioner of Hockey East, was named the conference's first commissioner and played an integral role in the development of the league as play between the nine squads began in the fall of 2003. As the season unfolded, the fledgling conference made its mark in college hockey with victories over non-conference opponents, along with an exciting chase to claim the first-ever regular season title. Holy Cross secured the title, and followed up that feat by capturing the tournament championship, sending the Crusaders to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in the program's, and the league's, history.

Since the 2006-07 season, AHA's conference championship has been held at Blue Cross Arena in downtown Rochester.

RIT, in its first season as a member of the conference, won the regular season title but was unable to participate in the Atlantic Hockey Tournament due to NCAA regulations. An all-service academy championship ensued, as Air Force defeated Army to earn a berth into the 2007 NCAA Tournament.

During the 2007-08 season, five teams entered the final two weekends of the regular season with a chance to secure the top seed. Army earned the top seed, but it was Air Force that defeated Mercyhurst in double overtime to claim its second straight conference title.

In 2008-09, Air Force and RIT split the regular season title, both with what was then an AHA record-setting total of 42 points. For the third straight season, the Falcons won the conference tournament, blanking Mercyhurst.

RIT set conference records with 22 wins and 45 points, rolling to the 2009-10 AHA regular season title. It was no different in the postseason, as RIT outscored its foes 18-5 in winning its four playoff games, including a 6-1 win over Sacred Heart in the championship game.

Last season, RIT won its fourth regular season title in the last five seasons, setting up a championship contest against Air Force. The Tigers would out-shoot Air Force 40-24, but could not solve Jason Torf, who was perfect in goal for the Falcons. Jacques Lamoureux scored the game's lone goal on a

power-play late in the second period to lift Air Force to its fourth AHA Championship in five years with a 1-0 win.

Success in the classroom is as important as success on the ice among the member institutions of Atlantic Hockey. A total of 140 student-athletes were named to the 2009-10 Atlantic Hockey All-Academic squad in recognition of their outstanding scholastic achievement. Atlantic Hockey athletes have also contributed their time off the ice to numerous charitable organizations as a way of saying thanks to their many supporters.

Currently, Atlantic Hockey spans a total of five states: four in the northeast and one western state, reaching from the Atlantic Ocean to the banks of the Great Lakes and out to the Colorado Rocky Mountains. Robert Morris and Niagara will join the conference for the 2010-11 season. Members reside in Connecticut (University of Connecticut, Quinnipiac, Sacred Heart), Massachusetts (American International, Bentley, Holy Cross), New York (Army, Canisius, Niagara, RIT), Pennsylvania (Mercyhurst, Robert Morris), and Colorado (Air Force).

# Tigers in the Community



RIT players and coaches are extremely active in the Rochester community, working with several causes over the last few seasons. On Jan. 30, 2010, RIT fans traded orange apparel for pink over the weekend and in the process raised \$21,248 to fight cancer. Zeta Tau Alpha sorority teamed up with the RIT men's and women's hockey teams in the "Pink Rink" event, where Ritter Arena transformed into a sea of pink. Pink Tiger jerseys were auctioned off and proceeds reached \$9,248. Jersey proceeds went to Rochester General Hospital's Lipson Cancer Center. Zeta Tau Alpha also raised more than \$12,000 from T-shirt sales. Those sales benefited the Susan G. Komen Cancer Foundation. Last season, the Tigers raised \$7,000 through the sale of special black jerseys to support the late Craig Charron of the Rochester Americans in his fight against cancer.





## RIT's 2010 Frozen Four Run



The 2009-10 RIT men's hockey team became the story of Division I college hockey after enjoying a magical run to the NCAA Frozen Four in just its fifth season at the Division I level. The Tigers became the first Atlantic Hockey Association squad to make the Frozen Four, and emerged as a national powerhouse. Head Coach Wayne Wilson won the Spencer Penrose Award as the National Coach of the Year.

RIT was the only team in Division I to win both its conference regular season and conference championships. The Tigers set AHA records with 22 wins and 45 points en route to capturing their third regular season title in four seasons. The Tigers continued their success into the Atlantic Hockey Tournament, sweeping Connecticut in the quarterfinals before shutting out Canisius 4-0 in the semifinals, and trouncing Sacred Heart 6-1 in the championship game on March 20.

From there, it was on to the NCAA East Regional in Albany, where RIT upset No. 2 overall seed Denver 2-1, and advanced to the Frozen Four after defeating No. 12 New Hampshire 6-2 in the regional final.

RIT's storybook season ended in the Frozen Four semifinal to national runner-up Wisconsin in front of a program record crowd of 34,954 fans. The Tigers finished the season ranked No. 10 in the *USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine* national poll, and were ranked as high as ninth.

RIT set school records with 28 wins, and a 12-game winning streak. After starting 0-5, RIT rolled to a 28-7-1 mark over its final 36 games.

The Tigers finished fifth nationally in goals per game (3.54) and fourth in scoring defense (1.20), a school record. RIT was fourth nationally in scoring margin (1.34). RIT was the only team to be in the top five nationally in all three categories.

# Men's Hockey History

In 1961, Director of Athletics L.A. Alexander Jr. wrote a letter to the Athletic Committee recommending that the committee approve the establishment of an intercollegiate hockey team at Rochester Institute of Technology. The measure was approved four years later in 1965.

The hockey club was founded in the fall of 1959. It was given a budget of \$1,020 to purchase the initial equipment to outfit 16 players. At that time, the team participated in the Monroe County Amateur Hockey Association, playing 13 games against three other league teams. The players paid \$195 out of their own pockets for these games and coached themselves along the way, as they didn't have the money to hire a head coach.

The next year, with a budget of just \$927, the season was composed entirely of away games, because the league was dissolved due to a lack of ice time at the Rochester War Memorial. With the help of Alexander, games were played against Hamilton JV, Colgate freshmen, Ithaca, Cornell freshmen, the University of Rochester, the University of Toronto, and the local hockey club "The Rockets."

In 1961-62, the budget was increased to \$1,113.20 with the help of the RIT Student Council. There were 14 games played on home ice, which at the time was the Rochester War Memorial. Those interested in playing on the team exceeded 45 men. This is the first year they had actual guidance, as James E. Musker became the volunteer coach. With the new NCAA rules, the school was required to purchase helmets for the team at a cost of \$62.50.

Although hockey had never been played at the Ritter-Clark Rink (as it was previously called), it can be said that the facility was built with hockey in mind. This is verified by two important factors: a) the rink was built to hockey specifications as to length and width of ice surface, and b) inserts were provided in the concrete floor to accommodate hockey goals. In 1961, backed by the Student Association and President Marvin Pozefsky, renovations were made to the Ritter-Clark Rink so that the RIT men's ice hockey team could call it their own.

In 1962, the team formed a league with other teams in the area that faced similar problems, either with money, ice time, or scholarships. The league was known as the Finger Lakes Collegiate Hockey League (FLCHL). It consisted of six schools: RIT, SUNY Brockport, Hobart, Ithaca, the University of Rochester, and Syracuse University.

Two years later, in 1964, RIT men's ice hockey became an official varsity sport. In 1972-73, the team became a member of the ECAC Division III. The ECAC was composed of two divisions, East and West. RIT played under the East Division.

In 1980, the RIT men's hockey program made a giant step forward by moving to the Division II level of play. This meant playing a challenging

25-game schedule featuring 16 matches against Division II teams. RIT also began playing in the New York State College Hockey League (NYSCHL), comprised solely of Division II schools. The league folded in 1985-86.

The 1982-83 season marked a milestone in the program, as the Tigers won their first NCAA Championship in Division II. In the two-game quarterfinal series, RIT defeated Mankato State and went on to beat Lowell 4-1 in the semifinals, advancing them to the championship game, where they defeated Bemidji State, 4-2.

The next year RIT moved to the Division III level. The Tigers repeated again as champions in 1984-85, this time at the Division III level, defeating Bemidji State once again, by a score of 5-1.

In 1988-89 the ECAC Division III formed two more divisions, adding a North and a South Division. With this change, RIT moved to the ECAC West and continued its status as a powerhouse in that division, winning seven conference titles in 17 seasons, including four straight, from 1998 to 2002.

The Tigers have made multiple trips to the big show—14, in fact. In 1988-89, RIT tied the first game in the two-game series against Wisconsin-Stevens Point, but ended its postseason play in the second game of the series, losing 3-2. In 1995-96, RIT made it to the championship game, losing 3-2 to Middlebury. In 2000-01, the team was ranked No. 1 in the nation the entire season and undefeated until losing the championship contest to SUNY Plattsburgh.

Several RIT players have earned national recognition for their play on the ice, as All-Conference, or All-Americans. In 1997, Steve Toll was named the Division III National Player of the Year. In 2001, Jerry Galway also earned that hallowed honor.

On Dec. 15, 2004, RIT President Albert Simone and Director of Athletics Lou Spiotti announced that the Tigers would be moving to the Division I level starting with the 2005-06 season. RIT became a full-fledged member of the Atlantic Hockey Association in 2006-07.

In 2006-07, RIT's second year as a Division I program and first as a member of Atlantic Hockey, the Tigers won the conference's regular season title. They finished the season with a 20-7-1 conference mark and won 21 games overall. The 21 wins against Division I competition were an improvement of 17 over its first season.

On March 7-8, 2008, the Tigers played their first postseason games as a Division I program, defeating Holy Cross both nights in overtime by scores of 5-4 in the Atlantic Hockey Association quarterfinals. That season, Simon Lambert made history by becoming RIT's first finalist for the Hobey Baker Award, Division I college hockey's most prestigious individual honor.

In 2008-09, RIT set a Division I school record by winning 23 games, and was victorious in 11 straight contests. The Tigers advanced to the AHA semifinals and were second nationally in goals per game (3.89).

In 2009-10, the Tigers made history by not only winning their first AHA Championship, but then shocking the nation by upsetting No. 2 Denver and No. 12 New Hampshire to win the NCAA East Regional and advancing to the Frozen Four in just its fifth season as a Division I squad. Head Coach Wayne Wilson was named winner of the Spencer Penrose Award as the National Coach of the Year. Wilson, who also won the Edward Jeremiah Award as Division III Coach of the Year in 2001, became the first coach to earn the national coach of the year honor at both levels.

RIT was the only team in Division I to win both its conference regular season and conference championships. At the Frozen Four in Detroit, Mich., RIT played in front of a school-record 34,954 fans. The Tigers were nationally ranked for the first time as a Division I program, and finished the season No. 10 in the *USA Today/USA Hockey Magazine* national poll, after climbing as high as ninth.

RIT set school records with 28 wins, and a 12-game winning streak.

Last season, the Tigers enjoyed another tremendous season, winning the AHA regular season title for the fourth time in five years, and were one goal shy of their second consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament. Associate Head Coach Brian Hills won the Terry Flanagan Award as the nation's top assistant coach.

RIT has proven to be a top team at the Division I level, just as it was at the Division II and III levels. What history will the Tigers make in 2011-12?

## Tiger Alumni in the National Spotlight

### Steve Toll

1996-97 National Player of the Year



**Steve Toll**, a native of St. Catharines, Ontario, became RIT's first American Hockey Coaches Association NCAA Division III Player of the Year after a sensational 1996-97 campaign.

That season, he set RIT single-season records with 39 goals and 84 points in 30 games en route to earning First Team All-American honors. His 45 assists were third most in one season at the university. The ECAC hockey coaches nominated him a first-team All-Star and was selected the RIT Hockey Fan's Choice award winner.

Toll also set single-season records with four consecutive hat-tricks early in the season en route to six on the year.

In Toll's three seasons, the Tigers compiled a 63-21-6 record and advanced to a pair of NCAA Tournaments. In 1995-96, Toll helped lead the Tigers to an NCAA Tournament runner-up finish with a 25-6-1 record.

In just three seasons, Toll recorded 77 goals, 108 assists, and 185 points in just 88 games, averaging 2.1 points per game. He was also named the 1994-95 ECAC West Rookie of the Year.

### Jerry Galway

2000-01 National Player of the Year



**Jerry Galway**, a native of Mississauga, Ontario, earned the 2002 American Hockey Coaches Association NCAA Division III Player of the Year after finishing fourth in the nation in scoring with 13 goals and 36 assists for 49 points. Galway ended his career as the leading scoring defenseman in the history of the program with 166 points, and had the most assists in a career by a defenseman with 120 (46-120-166).

During his career, Galway was a three-time JOFA/AHCA First-Team East All American (1998-99, 2000-01, 2001-02), two-time ECAC West Player of the Year (2001, 2002), and three-time All-ECAC West first team selection (1998-99, 2000-01, 2001-02). He was also an ECAC West All-Tournament Team selection and Chase Rochester Cup MVP, won the Craig Lauzon (1997-98) and Art Thomas Teammate Award (2000-01), and was a Division III Player of the Year finalist in 2000-01.

In 2000-01, Galway set a career-high with 58 points on 13 goals and 45 assists, helping lead RIT to a 27-1-1 record and a trip to the NCAA National Championship game. The Tigers finished 97-10-10 with four NCAA Tournament Appearances in Galway's four seasons at RIT.

### Simon Lambert

2007-08 Hobey Baker Finalist



Forward **Simon Lambert**, a native of Ste. Therese, Quebec, was a top-10 finalist for the 2008 Hobey Baker Award, college hockey's most prestigious honor. He became RIT's first Hobey Baker finalist after enjoying a phenomenal 2007-08 season for the Tigers. Lambert was a unanimous All-Atlantic Hockey Association first team selection and was awarded the leading scorer trophy. In addition, Lambert was named the RACA At-Large Male Athlete of the Year and was honored as the PAY-CHEX Male College Athlete of the Year.

Lambert finished fifth in the country with 51 points on 21 goals and 30 assists. The 30 assists were tied for sixth most nationally. Lambert recorded a program record 11-game point-scoring streak from Feb. 1 to March 15. He recorded a point in 27 games and had 17 multiple-point outings. Lambert had seven power-play goals, three game-winning tallies, and was plus-5.

For his career, Lambert finished with 63 goals and 89 assists for 152 points in 125 games. He is RIT's all-time leading Division I scorer with 55 goals and 77 assists in the three seasons, spanning 104 games. Lambert helped lead RIT to the 2006-07 AHA regular season title.

## Frank Ritter Ice Arena



Frank Ritter Ice Arena is home to the Rochester Institute of Technology men's and women's hockey teams, as well as the Genesee Figure Skating Club. The arena has hosted five NCAA Championships, most recently the women's Division III final in 2010-11. In 2008, the arena celebrated its 40th anniversary.

Formerly known as Shumway Arena, the facility has undergone several renovations. A new sound system, lights, ceiling, and dasher boards have been added to help make Ritter Arena one of the best facilities in the Atlantic Hockey Association. In the last four years, both team locker rooms were renovated, a visitor's locker room was added, and the compressors were replaced. In 2008, a state-of-the-art television studio was built to accommodate live hockey broadcasts on Time Warner Cable Sports. RIT is one of a handful of Division I programs that can broadcast games in high definition.

In 2011, a \$3.5 million project was completed to expand the current men's and women's hockey locker rooms, with coaching offices and video and training rooms to be added in the lower level of the arena.



### ► Game Night Atmosphere

With its intimate capacity of 2,100 (1,600 sitting, 500 standing), fans are right on top of the action. With the "Corner Crew" leading the way, fans at Ritter Arena cheer loudly and often. The crowds are among the most boisterous and loudest in Division I, and give the Tigers a distinct home-ice advantage. There is a plethora of banners celebrating RIT hockey's several conference and NCAA championships. In addition, there are several different promotions and special events between periods, making Ritter Arena the place to be on campus during the winter months.

### ► History

The arena is named after one of Rochester's most distinguished citizens. Frank Ritter was a founder of Rochester Athenaeum and Mechanics Institute (now RIT). He served on the Board of Trustees from 1885 to 1903, and was founder of Ritter Company, later a part of Sybron Co. The arena was dedicated in his honor in 1968.

### ► Media and Special Guests

Overlooking the south end is the John D. Pike Press Box, dedicated on Nov. 18, 1985. The facility is a gift of the John D. Pike Construction Co. and is named in honor of the company's founder. The press box has areas for media and special guests of the university.

### ► Special Activities

Numerous other activities have taken advantage of the arena's facilities. Some of these include:

- Genesee Figure Skating Club Invitational
- Rochester Youth Hockey practice sessions
- Monroe County Hockey League playoffs
- McQuaid Jesuit High School Tournament
- Empire State Games Championships

The arena also hosts the Tiger Hockey School, and the Genesee Figure Skating Club has conducted its 49th Annual Skating Academy. Learn-to-Skate classes and public skating are also offered throughout the year.
